

see how that legislation turns out. And Nebraska very often does not follow what other states do. We are the, probably the state that is most often placing ourselves in a separate category, unique, different. We are not afraid to be different in many ways, let alone the Unicameral system itself. And that's not, in itself, doesn't mean that it is bad. Most everything has some finality or some reasonable restriction in time. If you decide to appeal your taxes, so you don't line your valuation, you've got a time to do that, and if you miss those 45 days, you have no recourse. If you want to file a claim in an estate or pursue an action to invalidate a will, there are time constraints on that, and I would suggest that there have been cases where heirs haven't known about wills, and by the time they find out about it, it is too late for them to do something. There are generally in order for business to function and for business to progress in the way of life as we have it in this state, or in this nation, we generally have restrictions and reasonable times for people to decide to do things. Otherwise, we are in a terrible state of uncertainty for great lengths of time into the future. Now I don't know if ten years is a magic number that should never be changed. I wouldn't be able to stand here and say that it is. Maybe it is low, maybe it is high. I am not sure about that, you know, got to pick a number, but I do think that it is significant enough and it is a separate issue, a separate issue as I originally read 750, I do not think we should mishmash it into this bill, and if whoever wants to sponsor it wants to bring the bill to the committee, out of committee, Senator Will is raising his hand, he will do it, I just...I just would much rather...we will have the same debate, I acknowledge that, but I would rather do it that way myself. LB 750 had some other elements in it that I think are...deserve a great deal of discussion and should rise and fall on their own. The protections we put in place on nuclear waster transportation across this state, that is an issue I feel we should address. I don't think it should be...I don't think this should be piggybacked onto it.
