I don't see any reason why we shouldn't cut or hold the line, freeze this area, and there are other areas that I wish that we had been able to but I have one more amendment and it doesn't seem like there's a whole lot of senators out there willing to make suggestions on areas that they would be willing to look at. So it looks like we're going to hit the end of the year with...with the budget that came out of the Appropriations Committee without any changing...

SPEAKER WITHEM: Time.
