If they successfully complete it they would go back to court and would be sentenced to a term of probation, additional time, or discharge from custody at that point. If they do not successfully complete it, they go back and are sentenced on the original charge, similar to a violation of probation. That is exactly how a violation of probation is (inaudible).

SENATOR HILLMAN: Okay, but they couldn't just sent...I mean have them go to another facility, would have to go back through court and everything again to be able to change what facility they would be in?

SENATOR LINDSAY: Right, and that's because we are limited because of a court decision on what...on how we can handle that.

SENATOR HILLMAN: And the other one that was addressed, there is follow-up, and there was an article in yesterday's Omaha World-Herald that...

SENATOR CROSBY: Time.

SENATOR HILLMAN: And I'll punch my light. But for those of you that hadn't read it, I would suggest that you do.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Hillman. Senator Pedersen, on the Withem amendment.

SENATOR PEDERSEN: Madam President, members of the Legislature, I'm just going to visit with you a little bit about my experiences and some things I've been through in my life with young people in corrections. First of all, I want to explain to you what I see boot camps as. Boot camps in the United States military were there to build pride and to build discipline. And you joined the military or you were drafted into the military to fight for something that you thought was right and to defend something that was yours, your country. I supported boot camps this time around instead of the first time round because there was going to be some what I called structured programming in it. And one of the first things you need in structured programming is discipline. What we do today, colleagues, is we don't discipline youth until they commit a felony and then we throw
