

them in prison, we don't structure them. What Senator Bernard-Stevens talked about, 9&0, the bill that we passed a few years ago with community corrections, I support 100 percent. I'm watching the Office of Juvenile Services very closely to make sure that it doesn't turn into some kind of a kingdom and bureaucracy that's not going to deliver services to kids. And to be quite frank with you I'm scared of that because they keep asking for money and not talking about services and building bigger offices and moving on and hiring more people without delivering services. So I'm going to watch that. Thirty years ago, people, when I started at Father Flanagan's Boys Home as a counselor, I moved into a house with 20 adolescent boys. I lived with 20 adolescent boys close to 9 years. A lot of them boys had committed serious felonies. Boys Town, back then, was a structured program, as it is now, I'm not complaining at all what it is now, but back then we had a lot more felons than what places like Boys Town take today. This afternoon I was at court here in Lancaster County with a man just trying to help him out, and I missed part of the...the first part. But I was reading an article in the Newsweek about shall we bring back orphanages. And it had a lot of things about old Boys Town, long-term residential care. When they came in to these places you brought them, you kept them until they graduated from high school, and back then people, most of them then went on to the military, so you had another two to four years of structured living. Structure, discipline. Boot camps, if you want to call them boot camps, can work. But they're going to...the name is just in what people are hooking up with what they've had in the military. And what boot camps did in the military is a wonderful thing. But if we're not going to have programs, and not just a lot of social programs, yes, I'm a counselor but I have no way of making people well, it takes time with youth and it takes the help of the other youth and you don't do that in three, four months. You have to do this with time. You have to teach them to work, you have to teach them to say yes, you have to teach them to say no...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR PEDERSEN: ...and it can be done, it can be done. I, personally, don't like the word boot camp, but if boot camp is what we want to call it and it has a long enough program and enough structure and programs in it then I would support it. I believe it could work. But, people, if we're only going to put them in there part of that program is going to have to include a
