SENATOR LINDSAY: Okay, Senator Wehrbein, could you repeat the question? (Laughter.) Just kidding. To answer I guess those that at least grasp the general trends of those, first, Kearney, it's not going to be an extension of Kearney Youth Development Center because we're dealing with primarily youth who have been convicted as adults. More likely, if it's going to drain off anybody it might be off the secure youth facility when it comes on line. But it's intended, and the specific intent is we're trying to draw from a population that would otherwise be in prison. We're not trying to draw off of probation or ISP, intensive supervision probation. Where it falls in the scheme of things is prison is your most secure facility. Within the prison system you obviously have the different levels of security. Once outside of actual prison, we have now some community-based stuff, but we also have intensive supervision probation and probation. Boot camps would be somewhere between community-based programs and intensive supervision probation. It's intended to offer another step in that range of possible penalties that can be imposed. To answer your question about where we're going, populations are going upwards, prison populations are going upwards. We are...my indications from corr...my staff has been in contact with corrections, is that we will likely be looking at a prison, getting started within the next two years, probably going to look at the latest two years. I would suspect that you, as Appropriations Chair, and me as Judiciary Chair will be up here next year arguing to start, we need some big time money set aside now to start that prison building situation. The boot camps are not going to solve that problem. I think we will need a prison regardless, but I think it will slow it down and delay when we need to have that prison done, because we will be drawing off some of that increase as that escalation occurs. I think that answers some of the questions...

SENATOR HALL: One minute.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Pretty much. I think it does, too. And my point is I have told some Appropriations Committee Chairman, if history repeats itself, a year from now we will be back making this decision, bringing it to the rest of the body for you to
