

So I think we have to keep that in mind. The other thing, I have been here to the corrections center twice, on two occasions, and the things that I have heard in hearings from the correctional officers and the guards, the people who work with the prisoners every day, that one, probably the foremost problem that the man, young man or woman, because we have women at Geneva and York, and so on, boredom. Consider yourself 24 hours a day in one place. You're not on work release, you're there. You may not go down the road for...to McDonald's or whatever you want to do, can't go over to the park and go down the slide. When I was out there the one...late one afternoon I remember a lot of those young men were out running, running around the compound. Some of them were playing basketball. Some of them were playing other games, trying to keep fit, if nothing else, because being confined like that, and we find it here, don't we? We put on weight because we sit so much. We sit, we don't move around like we do in a normal way when we're not here during the interim. So from those...when those thoughts that I think a lot and then when Senator Day talked about the educational component, we lost some of that several years ago because of money. And the worst thing for me...for that...for that loss of money is that that was during the time when we did have a surplus and a lot of that money was used to give back to the...we de...a decision was made that the taxpayers should get that money back. A lot of them got like \$20. Nobody got any huge amounts. And I will just never quite get past that because we used up a lot of money there that we could have had in the reserve, we could have used in...when we had a crunch. But, aside from that, I do think Senator Pedersen and Senator Chambers too because he does go out there, I know he does, and I know he goes to the corrections on West Van Dorn. I don't do that. I admire people that are in the prison fellowship and people like Senator Pedersen and Senator Chambers and others, those...

SENATOR HALL: One minute.

SENATOR CROSBY: ...of you who do that kind of thing, because I know that when you come to see someone like that it's real...it's refreshing. I'll use that word, it's refreshing for them because it's a different face, a different person, someone who maybe will listen to them and they have a little break there that...and they don't get to do all the things that you and I take for granted.
