SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Wickersham. There are no other lights to speak to the Lindsay amendment. Senator Lindsay, you're recognized to close on your amendment.

SENATOR LINDSAY: I would just remind what we're doing here, and that is this amendment saves money. This amendment will reduce the appropriation under this A bill by \$71,000, which would then be through savings that would be accomplished by the...the adding of judges allows the ability to not hire temporary judges. So bottom line this...after all this discussion what this does is simply reduces the A bill by \$71,000. I would urge your vote in favor.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Lindsay. You've heard the close on the Lindsay amendment to the Withem amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of the amendment to the amendment.

SENATOR HALL: The Lindsay amendment is adopted. Anything further on the amendment?

CLERK: Nothing further, Mr. President.

SENATOR HALL: We're back to the Withem amendment that's pending before us. Senator Withem, you're recognized to speak.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Yes, Senator Wickersham took some exception to language I used, so I need to probably either retract that language or defend it. I am not going to retract it. The word recalcitrant, I think, was a kind word, particularly compared to some of Senator Chambers' reactions earlier this morning which had I spoken emotionally rather than rationally I might have used some of that language. The term recalcitrant I think applies to an organization that will sit down with senators, make certain representations as to a position that they have privately but refuse to do anything to assure us that they'll follow through with those representations. And that's why I used the word recalcitrant. Again, Senator Lindsay and I had numerous conversations with representatives from the Bar
