SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Bohlke, you have approximately two and a half minutes.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Thank you, Senator Hall, and, Senator Bromm, thank you. Really, Senator Bromm made some very strong arguments. I had said to Senator Bernard-Stevens, after his last comments, that pretty much what Senator Wickersham said, we were alerted for the first time last July that we were out of compliance. And so to simply say that if we weren't in session, we could ask for a waiver, as I pointed out, Kentucky isn't in session but we have been, and we have been in dialogue all along with the technical assistants determining if we are in compliance or not. Every indication that we have had in the continuing dialogue has been that we are not in compliance. And so that's why I said I certainly felt the obligation, as the Chair of the Education Committee, to try and bring this to the floor. I support this amendment because from the dialogue between Senator Withem and Senator Chambers and Senator Chambers being a peacemaker, and I went over and said, Senator Chambers, is not a gun a piece? And he said, yes; but I said, that's not what I think of you as a gunmaker, but I assume that we will be looking out for a resolution to this problem. And I support the amendment to do that.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Bohlke. Senator Fisher, do you care to speak to the amendment?

SENATOR FISHER: To the amendment to bracket till, when, tomorrow, now is that where we're up to?

SENATOR HALL: The amendment is May 23rd.

SENATOR FISHER: Yeah, I'd rise in opposition to that amendment and I rise in opposition to the previous amendment and I'd rise in support of the Bohlke amendment. You know we make a number, not too many but a number of dumb laws around here, and if this is truth in fact, Senator Bohlke's law is not too bright and it isn't...it maybe runs against somebody then we can change it. We will have...we'll be back here, this place isn't going to go anyplace, I guarantee you. We'll be back here January of next year and we can change it. We can enact a law and it will be put into force this summer, they'll have one school semester to
