SENATOR WESELY: Well, based on last year, if you can find a better language, I'd be happy to work with you on it, because we did not get...that's exactly what did not happen, the analysis of job needs and training needs, in my view, at least to the degree that we wanted. So, in conjunction, you are right, in conjunction would indicate, but it is the roundtable that shall. Your analysis of it is right. I am not sure if it's adequate or inadequate in terms of directing the state agencies that are under our control. I'd be willing to look at something that is more specific. So, if you have some ideas on it, Senator Chambers, or, Senator Hall, I'd be...

SENATOR LINDSAY: Time.
