The requirements are experience in general office work, preferred training in office procedures and practices, experience in mail processing and so on for \$1,000 a month. The point I am making here is I don't think they...we don't...we do have a lot of jobs. I read the want ads regularly. I started out on the want ad desk on the newspaper and it has become a habit over the years, and when you read the want ads of the jobs, the job descriptions are at the point where unless you have a highly professional degree of some kind, you aren't going to make a whole lot of money. There are some between 15 and 25 thousand dollars in legal offices and so on depending on your skills and depending on your education. But even here, again, here's another one from the state. Now this is a temporary, a data entry trainee, \$5.57 an hour, well, that does sound like a little on-the-job training. So many of them, there is no on-the-job training. Facilities Maintenance Technician I, well, do you know what that is; \$1,200 a month, routine plumbing, electrical, and carpentry. That is what they call a maintenance person that goes around and unclogs sinks and so on.

SENATOR LINDSAY PRESIDING

SENATOR LINDSAY: One minute.

SENATOR CROSBY: And so I just think, I don't...I am not going to have a lot of faith in the roundtable finding jobs for everybody. I think they will work at it. I am not saying they won't, but we are at a level in the State of Nebraska where certain jobs are always going to be low pay. They are never going to be very high paid. That's why most families, husband and wife both have to work. Even teachers aren't making millions of dollars. So, again, I just make my point that I think the Labor Department ought to be doing this already. If you want to put it in, fine, but it seems that that would be part of their mission, that they would know what jobs are available.
