

both. And I understand that it is a savings and it has a great deal of credit. I guess my only concern is knowing some of the very small communities who have a small grocery store if they're...how much will it cost them to put that in with the small amount of business they do?

SENATOR JANSSEN: Looking at what we had, I think it cost us around \$400, four or five hundred dollars to put this machine in. And I'm sure there's not a small grocery store going that wouldn't be glad to do that and spend that kind of money rather than going through the filing, separating the coupons. You have to make out a deposit slip with them every time, take them down to the bank. They have to be counted, separated. So it's money...it's a savings to them in the long run.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, I'm glad...I'm glad you got that number out there because I had no idea of whether you were talking about \$100 or \$5,000, because I had no idea and since you talked about it in that range I can't see that there would be any grocery store that would not want to comply if they expect to do the business, and that was the only concern I had, because I know some grocery stores that I've been in that don't have the capability yet and I guess I was curious of what it would cost. And I guess they would make that judgment based on the amount of business they were actually doing at the present time and so that would be the...that would be the idea that they would follow through on. So, with that explanation, I appreciate it. Thank you, Ray.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Crosby.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Lindsay, and members, I want to...I think maybe Senator Wesely might answer this question, or someone. What I want to know is I read this and I understand how it works and all that, but who audits and who accounts? The federal government? I mean, what kind of accounting system and what kind of auditing system? Someone said that it would probably do away with fraud. Well, you know, there are smart operators out there that can always figure how to work a system, but I'm not saying that would happen, necessarily, but does the federal government, are they the...
