

SENATOR PIRSCH: Oh, but those are usually put on when we advance it from Select to E & R.

SENATOR LINDSAY: These are those types of E & R...maybe you haven't encountered it, but these are those amendments, when E & R suggest them, they are not purely technical; changing an operative date, for example, is not a technical amendment, but it is one where they suggest a changing in operative date so that it is consistent throughout the bill, or for whatever reason. As I mentioned, I, frankly, cannot tell you exactly...I am, obviously, going to have to now, but they were recommended by E & R and I've just assumed that they know what they are doing.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Okay. Would you go on then, page 8...

SENATOR LINDSAY: The operative dates...

SENATOR PIRSCH: ...lines 2 to 4.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Right.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Lines 5 and 6, did you say?

SENATOR HALL: One minute.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Just a second here. Page 8, lines 22 and 23, dealing with the operative dates; page 8, line 27 through page 9, lines 1 to 9, excuse me, through page...line, or page 9, line 1; and the balance of page 9. And then in the definitions, page 8, lines 20 and 21; and page 9, lines 2 and 3.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Page 9, lines 2 and 3.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Right. And then...

SENATOR HALL: One minute, or, excuse me, time. Senator Chambers, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I would like to divide the question.

SENATOR HALL: Senator Chambers, clearly the amendment is divisible, but could I ask yourself and Senator Lindsay, Senator Pirsch, if you would like to come up here since you started that
