

thing, we're not going to have some of the programming that is available and the intent of having it near the city was having some of the programming available that would otherwise not be available, meaning that's going to have to be brought in and again driving up the costs if we're to have that available or simply not have it available. The third thing to have access for the families of the majority of those who are going to be there because oftentimes you work with both family and the inmate in trying to rehabilitate the youngster if that rehabilitation is possible. I think this was fully debated last year on the concept of where and what the underlying amendment simply does is within that same area it moves that line, but it still keeps it in the same general area. I would urge the defeat of the Cudaback amendment.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Thank you, Senator Lindsay. Senator Fisher.

SENATOR FISHER: Mr. President and members, my, my, my, this is something I really love to hear. Senator Preister, what an inconvenience to drive a few miles. Well, being born outstate, raised outstate, you know, I guess I never really complained about it and the roads, I complained about the quality of the roads and perhaps the air service occasionally, but what an inconvenience. You know this isn't a Sunday school we're building, this is a penitentiary. This is a detention center. Some of the most successful ones, incidentally, are the ones in Florida. That's way out in the swamp and nobody goes to it. And another factor, John Lindsay, that that doesn't come up. We talk about a convenience to go and visit these inmates or criminals or whatever you want to call them, their parents don't show up. We need to get them out of that environment so that's a few trips they might and, in fact, I don't think the real successful centers don't care to have the folks back there. I happen to be unfortunate to be an acquaintance of some friends that have their child in one of these centers and retraining. It's a private one. They're not permitted to visit. They're in there for a purpose and I think we need to get them out of that environment. Another one that jumps in my mind that I'm thinking about is the one in...I was talking to the folks from Nevada. I said, where do you put yours? Do you put it around the center? No, we put it out in the desert. We put it out and away. These folks need a new environment, a new start in life. We don't need to have their buddies coming down and waving at them and calling in on them. They're there for a purpose. It's
