

over again in wherever we're going to site the facility. Certain assumptions, in the implementation of 988 as a whole, certain assumptions have been made. One of those assumptions was not moving everything we've done to another part of the state, so I think there's some things that we are going to have to look at. With that, because at this point I think we need to spend some time on this, and if that's the decision of the body, we'd better make sure that we've got this section completely rewritten and back to where we need it to be so that it works with the decision that we've just made. With that I would yield the balance of the time to Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Lindsay. Senator Bernard-Stevens, you are recognized.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Thank you. Senator Hall, how much time is remaining?

SENATOR HALL: Six minutes and 15 seconds.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Thank you, and I first of all have to say in a humorous manner that I suspect an Omaha's conspiracy already. Senator Abboud came up to me about five o'clock and we had a friendly wager that I wouldn't say anything the rest of the evening, that I couldn't say anything and I said, you're on, no problem. Then I have an Omaha senator yield me time and ask me a question and I think I've been framed, but, nonetheless, I've already paid my dues and once again Omaha soaked the central and western part of the state. But, nonetheless, Senator Lindsay, on a much more serious note, I have ready to file and I will file at the appropriate time here shortly the reconsideration of the Cudaback amendment. You're absolutely correct, it was much more serious of what the body just did and I don't want to go as far as say I'm offended, but I think we have broken a lot of agreements and a lot of work and a lot of study for economic development and I think we've done it for exactly the wrong reasons. And I'll get into that when I have my light on. But, Senator Lindsay, you are correct that one of the underpinnings of 988 was the community-based program and there was going to be pilot projects that were going to be underway. In fact, that's part of the budget that we just passed today that we will wait and see what passes the Governor's scrutiny and what doesn't, but I'm very convinced that the \$2 million that was put in for community-based programming will be there. And Senator Lindsay was also correct
