PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Senator Wickersham, do you wish to speak to the motion to reconsider?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Thank you, Madam President, members of the body. I guess since there have been discussions of Harrison, and I think I heard Fort Robinson, I ought to note that other communities in my district are Chadron, Alliance, Rushville, Hay Springs, Harrisburg, Henry, Morrill and a couple of unincorporated sites, one of them is Agate. I didn't vote for Senator Cudaback's amendment because I thought that we should locate a juvenile facility in any of those communities. Incidentally, I think I left out Hemingford, so I better be careful, I don't want to leave any of them out. Crawford. All right. That isn't the reason I voted for Senator Cudaback's amendment and I didn't vote for Senator Cudaback's amendment because I think juvenile detention facilities ought to be the subject matter for economic development plans by some silly chamber of commerce. That isn't the reason I did that. And I didn't vote for his amendment because I thought it was a vote against kids in the metropolitan area of Omaha, that isn't the reason I voted for his amendment. I didn't vote for his amendment to hold up the discussion on the rest of this bill. Frankly, I think we ought to move on to some of the other more substantive matters in the bill. I'm kind of interested in finding out what it is Senator Lindsay's amendment does and having him explain those to us. We might spend the rest of the evening on this issue, which I think, quite frankly, is probably a side issue once you begin to think about it. And I didn't vote for that, for Senator Cudaback's amendment because I wanted to listen the rest of the night to Senator Bernard-Stevens reargue the juvenile justice bill. And I didn't vote for Senator Cudaback's amendment because I wanted to offend Senator Chambers, or any other member of this body. I voted for Senator Cudaback's amendment because I think we have a process that can be used appropriately to determine the the site for the facility. We put in place processes to make those decisions. And when this body short circuits those processes I think we're more apt to have a bad decision. And that's the reason I voted for Senator Cudaback's amendment. I don't really care where the thing is if it provides the services that are needed to the kids that will be using it and needing them. But I don't think we ought to short circuit our processes, that's what offended me
