

of person, I'm not too optimistic that you will change your votes, but I sincerely believe that it would be the right thing to do. And I just ask you to think about it. Thanks.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Pirsch.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Thank you, Madam President and members of the body. We've spent five and a half hours now and we're on the second amendment of Senator Lindsay's amendment. And now we're reconsidering the Cudaback amendment to the Lindsay amendment of the second amendment. And more hours are flying by. And this is an important issue and I don't want to make light of the concerns of those of you who live outside of Douglas County, outside of the metropolitan. And my first speech on this was to talk that we do need the infrastructure, that we do need the traffic, we do need the transportation that I thought the metropolitan area could provide. But I do understand Senator Cudaback's amendment and I do understand why 27 senators voted for that. But I'm going to do a Senator Beutler now and I'm going to talk about a completely different proposal, and that is going to start with the more substantive amendments that are ahead of us that I fear, as I predicted when we started on the Lindsay amendment, that we will never get to. And when cloture comes we are going to vote on the amendment we're on, on that Lindsay amendment, and then on the advancement of the bill. And let me tell you, and you have this orange paper that was... that very well states the concerns with the entire Lindsay amendment, not this portion. I really don't care where this is located, well, I do care because, as I said, I think the infrastructure and everything is in the metropolitan area. But what I do care is that if so many of you, 27 of you are caught up in parochial concerns about where this particular juvenile facility is that, indeed, you will be so anxious to make sure it is not in the metropolitan community that you will ignore these other substantive amendments that are concerned with the Lindsay amendment and contained in the Lindsay amendment. Division (E), which is the 11th number, which we will probably not get to, is... strikes the entire section on allowing access to juvenile criminal history. If we adopt that or we adopt the Lindsay amendment, we would hamper law enforcement, county attorneys and judges from reviewing legitimate sources of criminal information. The next division, (F), which is number 10, that strikes the increased penalties for drive-by shootings. We were talking about the use of firearms and Senator Lindsay brought up how that would apply to a drive-by shooting. Well, the Lindsay
