SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Senator Hudkins. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Madam Chairman, members...or Madam Chairman (laugh), Mr. Chairman, Senator Chambers, would this...would this amendment...would this include, if I'm an instructor in a school and I bring someone in to, you know, talk about guns and so forth, as a guest lecturer, I guess, would this include this person, too, do you...as you perceive it or see it?

SENATOR LINDSAY: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All that my amendment does is say that if it's in a setting where the youngsters are going to be involved and they have to be under the directorship or guidance of an adult, that adult must be one who could lawfully possess firearms. So whatever the set of circumstances would be, if the youngsters are going to be allowed to handle or make use of these firearms in this structured setting, on the school grounds or at a school sponsored activity, the adult who is in charge of them must be able, under the law, to legally possess firearms. And it does...it doesn't say who this adult would be, other than what's in the bill.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Just anybody that would be a lawful person that's an employee of the school, is that what you're saying, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right, for example, next year when Senator Schellpeper gets the bill that allows everybody to carry concealed weapons, they could see a guy walking down the street with a bulge in his coat and call him in and let him show the kids how to operate this piece,...

SENATOR HARTNETT: Okay, thank you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...if he's lawfully possessing it.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Thank you.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you. Senator Schmitt.

SENATOR SCHMITT: Yes, Mr. Speaker, members, I, too, rise in support of Senator Chambers' amendment. I think this clarifies
