

and be welcomed by your Legislature. Thank you for being here. The next speaker is Senator Bromm and I understand we have a request for a division of the amendment. Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Yes, thank you, Madam President. I would like to ask that the Chair divide the amendment, basically asking that the first part of the amendment dealing with page 27, line 26, which says the area will not interfere with normal activities of migratory birds, be the first division, and the second division be the balance of Senator Preister's amendment.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: And I would like...may I also address that? I guess we need to settle that question first, if there's any objection or...

SENATOR CROSBY: The Chair has decided that the amendment is divisible, as Senator Bromm has described. Senator Preister, is that satisfactory with you? And which one would you like to take up first? Which section?

SENATOR PREISTER: Thank you, Honorable President, friends all. Yes, I accept Senator Bromm's division and will not oppose that. And in terms of the order, we can take them as they are on there and start with number one and then go to number two.

SENATOR CROSBY: All right, the first section is lines 1 to 3, and, Senator Bromm, we'll recognize you on the first section of the amendment.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Madam President. As I listened to the debate here today, and I came in with some indecision about how I felt about this amendment, it seems to me that most everyone that's spoken does not want to do something or does not want Game and Parks to do something that would interfere with the activities of migratory birds. There seems to be a difference of opinion about what does and what doesn't interfere, and I don't know that...I know that I'm not expert enough or don't have the experience enough to know whether five miles or two miles or a half mile or 110 yards interferes. There seems to be a great difference of opinion out there. I think most of us received communication from residents near Valley who indicated that they used to see bald eagles frequently in the area until the controlled shooting operation
