What one person might not consider to be interference with their neighbor, you know, I've got a neighbor, I live in town, I've got a neighbor who has an implement business in the residential area and there's no zoning ordinances so he runs tractors all hours of the night and I have to acknowledge that sometimes it bothers me but I don't think I have the right to go out there and interfere with his rightful duty to do what he's doing and I guess I'm trying to figure out what the interpretation is. Maybe I can use it if (inaudible)...
