

and then if you agree then maybe we could move past this bill, come right back, or stand at ease while we work something out. But I think all we would have to do is indicate that the provisions...in the new language, all we would have to do is say for purposes of this section, police animal means a horse or dog owned or controlled by the state for the purpose of assisting a trooper, or you could say a peace officer acting pursuant to the peace officer's official authority. We just strike everything that refers to in all of the new language where we find it, political subdivisions or any law enforcement agency.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time. Thank you, Senator. Senator Witek.

SENATOR WITEK: Senator Chambers, are you going to leave the floor? Because I do have some more questions.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If you call me, I will answer.

SENATOR WITEK: Okay, I guess I do have some more questions on this, since...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR WITEK: ...this is your concern and you seem to have all the answers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And you've got 21 minutes.

SENATOR WITEK: I know I do and I'm watching them.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR WITEK: And you can't leave anyway because you've got to be here for the next one. You know, you've got to get your licks in the next one, right? Okay, on this bill my concern is that these individuals sometimes will be in the commission of a crime. Is that not true? It's not always just some innocent bystander, right? I mean, wouldn't...it says in there working conditions.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: There are off...right, there are officers who commit crimes, as in the Rodney King case.
