

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Twelfth, well, see, you pay attention to what I say. But, Senator Maurstad, what I was getting at was since you left, your influence has resulted in other things leaving and the city is on the way down, so they better pay attention to you. But you know the term quid pro quo means something for something. So, in a sense, some of us are asking...being asked to give the quid without knowing what the pro...I meant without knowing the quo is going to be, and nobody on the Appropriations Committee can give me any inkling? Are you speaking just for yourself, or you believe that this is what all the committee members would say, should I ask them?

SENATOR MAURSTAD: No, first of all, I'm just reporting a fact to you in that the Appropriations Committee has not met relative to the other bills, that's just a fact. And so other than that, it would be my opinion that obviously I couldn't share anything with you until they did meet. But relative...if I could make a comment...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Sure.

SENATOR MAURSTAD: ...relative to the quid pro quo comment, in this particular situation, I think that we need to look at this override on the merits of the project...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, since it's on my time,...

SENATOR MAURSTAD: ...and not on a quid pro quo.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...you have my vote on this one, no matter what I say about how I feel in general. So on your time, you can make an appeal, because I see your light on for the others votes. I want to ask Senator Wehrbein a question, though. Senator Wehrbein,...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...it will be...will you be the one to decide when the committee is called into session and which matters will be considered by the committee for purposes of override?
