SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, we have two items, each of which can stand independently of the other, and for that reason I'm asking that the division be made.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Chambers, it's my interpretation of Rule 6, Section 14 that the procedure for after a veto does not allow for a division, that it does allow for an amendment but not for a division, and as such I will not allow a division at this time. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Madam President, not to be argumentative, but since it's a ruling and I'm...I want to be clear on what you're saying, I understand the part about the amendment. But I see a distinction, so you'll understand what I'm saying, between dividing a question and amending it. But you say that since it mentions that it takes 30 votes to amend it, it's therefore indivisible?

PRESIDENT ROBAK: That's my ruling, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I have to challenge the Chair.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Chair has been challenged. Senator Chambers, to open on the challenge.
