we do battle in here among ourselves for 90 days, go home with a ton of bills sitting on the Governor's desk and let the Governor make the final decisions on what the overall spending patterns of the state will be and what the...and what the individual policy decisions will be. As we stand here right now there are a lot of bills on the Governor's desk, not all that...not a tremendous number, but any number of them that I think people in this body have worked hard on and we deserve the last say on those. I'm not going to read all of them, but Senator Crosby's bill, dealing with the hearing impaired is on the Governor's desk; Senator Coorssen's bill dealing with vehicle financial responsibility; the...prohibit the acts relating to police animals; the General Affairs Committee bill on pickle cards, lotteries and raffles; just reading a few of these, loan restrictions and change disclaimer requirements under the Political Accountability Act, I think that might still be, I thought that one had come back but evidentially it hasn't, at least by this list; Senator Robak's bill on Rehabilitation Support Mental Health Services Incentive Act. I think those of us that have been around here a while have experienced occasions when the Governor, whoever the Governor is, and this has absolutely nothing to do with Ben Nelson, it happened with Kay Orr, it happened with Ben Nelson, it probably...with Bob Kerrey, and also, I'm sure, happened with Charlie Thone, and going back in history, the Legislature goes home and lets the Governor have final say. And sometimes the vetoes are necessary, sometimes they aren't, they're ones that the Legislature would like to have a final say over. That's what this motion will do, it will restore some of the balance of power, in my opinion, between the executive branch and the legislative branch. People have asked me, well, what bills am I concerned with? Personally, personally I'm not concerned with any of them. The one I might have been most concerned with is one that is going to be put at risk anyway because I agreed to Senator Chambers' amendment on the Sarpy County judgeship yesterday, and that's one that will have to be read on the very final day. I don't have any specific issues in mind. I don't have...as a matter of fact, my inclination, when we come to voting for veto overrides, particularly on budgetary matters, I usually don't. So it's not on any specific issue. And I'd ask you, as the membership, to make that decision also. You know I'm concerned and I've seen kin' of support for this wane and ebb and flow, other sorts of language like that, analogies like that I could make, based on what bill's out there. A number of people were coming to me yesterday saying, well because the ethanol bill was being held
