I described to Senator Stuhr as touching hot buttons that would get a lot of play in the papers, even though the issue was not as significant as he made it, but the bill had meaning to those who worked on it and those who had sponsored it. And were a chance given to override, those kind of bills would have been overridden. I had seen one indication by the Governor where he had some dissatisfaction that we were thinking about doing this and coming back after we had taken some days off. And I do believe that when we've worked on some of the bills that we've had here and we've stayed late at night on some of those bills, and we've stayed late at night to make sure some had a chance to go up to E & R and come back so that there would be the requisite amount of time for them to rest on Final Reading so that they could be read according to the constitution. Why did we do all that? Why don't we just, as a policy among ourselves, decide that any bill that if it's passed it will be on the Governor's desk more days than remain in the session, just don't worry about passing them. Instead of doing all that scrambling and the arguing that we do to pass these bills, then hope and pray that he will sign them. Even while we're in session, even before some decisions have been made by the Appropriations Committee criticisms were coming from the Governor because he's running for the Senate. He is making this a very political year, and the Legislature is playing into that. I believe bills will be vetoed by him this time around that ordinarily wouldn't be. They're the kind of bills that can be used for other purposes. I see where Senator Dole, I see where the Governor of California are doing things now in opposition to programs that they supported before, because they're both running for the president. So once the bug bites a person to go for a higher office, they behave in a way different from the way they ordinarily do. And for my part I wish we would do this every session if we take seriously the work that we did. So I'm going to support...

SENATOR HALL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...what the Speaker has done, but in all of the 25 years that I've been here...Senator Withem said this may have been done one time, but I come back every day, and whether we adjourn and come back the 8th, or come back tomorrow and adjourn, I'll be coming down here just as though we were in session, so my work doesn't end. And as I've said before, the bills that I had, if you all would have voted not to pass them, I wouldn't have lost any sleep over it, I would have just
