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back several weeks, there was a time in this session when it was questionable whether the mainline appropriations bill would be passed in a fashion that would require the Governor to get it back to us with his vetoes before our adjournment day. And under those conditions I certainly would have voted to extend the session, had we gotten bogged down to that extent. Relative to my priority bill, if the Governor wishes to veto the bill and let flawed and partially unenforceable statute continue to be in place, that's certainly his prerogative, and there's always another day. I, at this time, do support the continuing tomorrow and adjourning after the completion of the work tomorrow because of how the situation has unraveled, or whatever the proper word would be, this week and that we have made significant process, the appropriations bill is back, we can take care of that. There is a potential, I suppose, that some things will be vetoed, including my bill by the way, but one thing that hasn't been mentioned that perhaps is of a minor consideration, that there is a considerable taxpayer expense, not in the overall scheme of things, but unnecessary expense in view of all of the mileage that all of us would get for another week's travel, which we may or may not come back in but we would be forced to. I know that's not a lot of money, but certainly it is, if it is not necessary, and that's a decision we'll make ourselves, maybe it's something that we need not do under the situation that exists tonight. Thank you, Mr. President.

This is my 17th year, I've seen many a time where we've left, gone home and then worried and wondered about what would happen as our bills sat over in the Governors desk, and then after vetoes come down, after we've gone home and we wish we had the chance to do something about it, but that chance wasn't there because we didn't take this step, we wonder why we didn't make a change. Well this is finally the first time that we do have the opportunity, ahead of time, to take control and seize
