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the opportunity to have that last word. In the past always the Governor had that. We left, the bills sat there, they contemplated, took action and there was nothing more we could do. This is a chance for the Legislature to say, you've got your chance, you make your decisions, but then we're coming back and we'll have the last word, and that is very critical, because, as was talked about, we've spent a lot of time, we've worked through a lot of issues, this is the ultimate policy-making body for the State of Nebraska. We're the voice of the people, each of us representing different districts, coming together, setting the policy, that's the Legislature's role, that's the important responsibility that we have. And this is a very important step to take, not only for this year but into the future. I hope we will take that step. I understand the desire to go home, I understand there's a lot of pressure not to do this. But the five days, we give five days for the Governor to act, then we come back, this is fairly typical in other states. If you check around in other states they do this, and I think it's been to the benefit of the legislative branch. It doesn't have to be a detriment to anybody, to the Governor, whoever that may be, or to any individual members if we start to plan for this in the future. This change may have caught some by surprise, but it's a change we ought to make and take and move forward with. So again, I rise in support of the effort by the Speaker and ask your support as well. Thank you.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Wesely. Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Mr. President, members, old Father O'Mally (phonetic) used to say, at the monastery, there comes a time when we should meditate, I think that's about it. I think we're not really finished understanding what we've done today or in some cases what we've done so far this session. I think we deserve a chance to think about everything and the chance to consider how that should be dealt with next Thursday. I would hope we would support this effort. I think it's a responsible move on our part, and I hope we wouldn't let simply the inconvenience of it stand in our way of doing this thing.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Lynch. Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Mr. Speaker, members, a guy once said it isn't over until it's over, and I guess it won't be over tomorrow, so I say we stick around until that time comes. So
