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has tremendous power. The Speaker did not put this as a part of the agenda when he laid it out but he always has an opportunity to go ahead of everybody else which is an awesome amount of power when your job is to stifle a certain individual and make sure that amendments which he had the foresight to file will not be dealt with. And, as I've said from the very beginning, do whatever you want to with you all's rules. They're your rules and I always have to remind you that I voted against them. You all voted for them. Now because I complied with your rules and I filed my motions according to your rules, you now want to suspend your rules so that they cannot be considered. The Speaker can and anybody else can, in his or her arrogance, say none of these things will be adopted, none of these motions will be successful, therefore, don't allow them to be considered. That is arrogance. That is autocratic, but that's the way some people operate and if that some person can persuade enough of you all to go along with him, well, Withem, he will have his way. Senator Withem, that was one that slipped out, that wasn't planned. But I don't care if you adopt his motion or not. However, what I would rather have seen is a motion by the Speaker to suspend the rules so that those bills that have not lain over for the requisite number of days could be read, number of days required by our rules, not the Constitution, so that they could be read. That, I would have no problem with. And then go into this politically motivated aspect of the agenda whereby you would say the one whom you do want to throttle, I agree, and we all know that, who had the foresight to follow your rules, as we know he always does, should be prevented from doing what he is attempting to do under your rules by your voting to change the rules in the middle of the game. It's not a surprise, a motion such as this, it's just one that elevates me to that level again that makes it difficult for me to be humble among such pedestrian individuals. None of the rest of you merit this kind of fear and dread. None of the rest of you will have rules changes offered to give the Speaker power to squelch you...

SENATOR HALL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...because none of you are deemed to be in the league in which I find myself. So I'm not offended by this. It just gives me another opportunity to point out how those on the proper side of the bell curve must deal with those who are the inferiors, based on the bell curve philosophy. There was plenty of time to put a motion up there to allow the suspension
