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speaking for Senator Will but my intention in filing that proposal was to get before the body the question of how we facilitate the process a little better. If you talk to people from other states, if you have an opportunity to do that this summer, please talk with them about their process. Most of them have, or at least the ones I've had a chance to talk to, have a means of getting to the question to have reasonable debate but get to a point where you do decide the question and you have a chance to debate the merits of the bill, the guts, if you will, the guts of the bill. And that's the problem we seem to have is we never can debate the guts of the bill because of amendments to amendments, divisions of amendments until you forget what the original bill was all about. Our time here is not just our time. We're here...Senator Chambers, I admire an awful lot of what you do, but when you say that this is your time, that you control this time, I have to take issue with that because we're here representing 33,000 people, each of us, and they expect us to use the time wisely and I...I expect that you're using your time as wisely as you can but...but we all have our sense of what we think is a wise use of time and we don't all...we'll not all agree on what's the best use of our time. At least we'll have a chance, if we pass this motion, I hope, to vote on these bills and if you don't like them, for heaven's sakes, don't pass them, and they'll be here next year. But let's get the issues debated and handled and again I surely hope the body sees fit to pass this motion. Thank you.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Thank you, Senator Hall. Members of the Legislature, I probably would be one of the two or maybe three votes that will be opposing this rule. I think it's...I think it's a bad precedent. And I agree with Senator Bromm, there are bills that I would like to see passed. I would like to see the welfare bill pass. There are parts of the crime bill that I like. I would especially like to see special education pass, and so on. But this isn't the second year of the biennium. This isn't where we all of a sudden say, my gosh, if we don't do something right now, everything fails. And I remember even on Micron where we went and we debated the entire time into the evening, we still had a chance on Final Reading to make motions to decide if we were going to debate the bill. All bills this year, for the most part, have had three rounds of debate as necessary. And, all of a sudden, now we say we're
