CLERK: 33 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the motion to suspend the rules to permit consideration of two other resolutions.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The rules are suspended. We will now consider legislative resolutions collectively. Those resolutions are LR 264, LR 265, LR 266, LR 267, LR 268, LR 269, LR 270, LR 272, LR 273, and LR 274 and LR 275. We will start with LB 264 (sic), Senator Landis. Excuse me, LR 264.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Madam President. This resolution honors the Nebraska native Julie Wilson who has had a recording and performing contract and career, rather, in New York for the last 40 years, and she returns to Nebraska this summer to appear in the Nebraska Repertory Theater season in a play called, "I Hate Hamlet", in mid to late July, a play that I'll be appearing in as well. And as a favorite daughter of the state, she comes back and graces our presence with actually a world renown career and this honors her.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Landis. Is there any further discussion on LR 264? LR 265. Senator Kristensen.
