

CLERK: Senator, I just have an announcement if I may interrupt you. I'm sorry.

We had a long hearing in Judiciary. Senator Chambers opposed it, and, as you see, he's handed out his amendments again. Oddly enough, I think that he should be with me. If you read the two editorials that I handed out last week, and I'm not going to chop down another tree and waste anymore paper by handing them out to you again, but the one thing that jumps out at me each time when I read this and when I read a lot of the material that we have, the best selling three dollar sticker that proclaims fight crime, deport, I can't even say the six-letter...seven-letter word because, to me, it is so hateful, so derogatory, so demeaning.
