

SENATOR WILL: One minute.

SENATOR WARNER: ...exception of age and equal pay. That current law was silent and there's been time frames established by the court in those cases. But I believe what you're referring to is public accommodation. We extend the period rather than shorten it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But here's what I'm asking, Senator Warner. If a person doesn't become aware of the fact that he or she was discriminated against within that thirty-day period, a complaint cannot be filed, can it, under the lang...the new language that's being added, even if it's an attempt to improve a situation?

SENATOR WARNER: Now they have ten days under the same basis. We extend it to thirty to provide more opportunity. Again, as public accommodations, I imagine the theory is that those kind of circumstances ought to be addressed in a relatively short period of time because of the nature of the public accommodations.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Warner, suppose I went to the new Westin Aquila in Omaha to rent a room and they told me they didn't have...

SENATOR WILL: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...any rooms available.

SENATOR WILL: Senator Warner, your light is next.

SENATOR WARNER: I believe, Senator, that under current law you'd have ten days. Now you have thirty if this bill is passed, I believe.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you, Senator Warner. Senator Chambers, you have spoken three times on this amendment. Senator Witek, there are no further lights, you are recognized to close.

SENATOR WITEK: Thank you. We'll kind of get back on track here on to the actual amendment, although I understand there are other things in the amendment and the bill that are of concern to Senator Witek and others. My amendment would strike
