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SENATOR CHAMBERS: And what did she tell you?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: A quarter and a nickel.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: She is right...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...because a quarter is not a nickel. There are a lot of things that appear to be a certain way when in reality they are not. It is possible to balance this commission with the language that is in the bill now. It is possible to balance the commission with the language that is in the bill now. Oh, and, Senator Schimek, that is all I was going to ask you. I was just trying to lighten the atmosphere a little bit. What the Supreme Court has said in construing legislation, it will look at what is the intent of the legislation, what is a reasonable construction to put on it, and it will construe it in such a way as to achieve a reasonable rather than an unreasonable result, or to achieve a result intended rather than one which is not intended. The court is very familiar with various public bodies being composed of an unequal number of members, as is the Supreme Court, itself, consisting of seven members. So to balance, when we are talking about legislation, does not mean you have exactly the same thing on one side of the scale as you have on the other. Some things lend themselves to this kind of precise division; other things do not. And I had said that earlier. This is one of those things which does not. So, in mandating if we had chosen to do that that there be balance obtained, that could be done. We are not dealing with mathematical equations, but since the body is of the mind to believe that it cannot be done, Senator Schimek is offering an amendment which allows you to keep the hoax language, that we are going to make the public think something is being done and there really is not, not at all. You go to the carnival and they have all kinds of things that lure you and make you think you can win all these stuffed animals that you wouldn't pay a quarter for at a store, but you'll spend all this money trying to knock over milk bottles that you can't knock over or loop one of these little hoops over a peg that you can't hoop it over to get one of these things that you don't want anyway. So that's what we are dealing with in this bill, hucksterism and a
