PRESIDENT ROBAK: Or minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and then we come to a very serious issue like this and there cannot be a vote for this amendment, because I will not then support the bill. The way I vote on the bill should not determine how somebody else will vote. It can be a basis for arguing with the strategy or the tactic that I am employing. And all that is fair in our discussion and our debate. But, Senator Landis, I think, kind of lapsed in what we just went through by saying that he will vote against this amendment. Now I didn't vote for it the last time because I had to be in a position to reconsider. I could have voted against it, putting me on the prevailing side, and still be in a position to reconsider. But, I cannot bring myself to vote against this proposition. I'll tell you how I've changed my position the other way. When bills and propositions were being brought before us to impose...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time. Senator Chambers, your light is next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How many... Madam President, which time is this for me?

PRESIDENT ROBAK: This is your third time, Senator.
