

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: All right, okay. I think I will support Senator Hillman on what she is doing because I do think that ought to be in there, unless there are some pitfalls that I haven't heard yet. Thank you.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Beutler, on the Hillman amendment to the Dierks amendment. Senator Beutler is waiving off. Senator Chambers, on the Hillman amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker, and members of the Legislature, I would like to ask Senator Hillman a question first, and then I might have to follow it up with one to Senator Dierks.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Hillman.

SENATOR HILLMAN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Hillman, in the language which you want to regain in the bill, we see where it says, the reporting entity claims exemption from the prohibitions contained. Now, whether or not they would claim this exemption from the prohibitions or be subject to the prohibitions, they would still have to report, is that correct?

SENATOR HILLMAN: I would think so, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, when they claim exemption, it would mean that they are not violating the terms of I-300. Is that correct?

SENATOR HILLMAN: Yes. Okay, in my estimation it would, and those are specifically laid out in the constitution.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, now if they are not exempt, they are going to be required to implicate themselves in a violation of the law, aren't they?

SENATOR HILLMAN: Well, there is some question as to how that, whether it would be, you know, self-incriminating in that if they made a mistake, you know, and put something down that wasn't right, but also again in the constitution it says, you know, it lays out certain things that says, then you are in
