SENATOR DIERKS: Okay.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Now, if I put down there that the purpose is any lawful purpose, am I filing false information?

SENATOR DIERKS: I don't think so.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. But if I put that down, am I giving the Secretary of State any information, one way or another, about how this constitutional provision might apply or might not apply to me? What useful information do I convey?

SENATOR DIERKS: I understand that, but I think what you're doing is you're actually giving them the additional information like the members of the corporation or shareholders. You're giving them information for the purpose for which it was formed, that's going to be part of the reporting form, so there he'll have the information about whether you're an agricultural corporation or whatever entity. You're also giving them the type of corporation that it is. So between those three items, you've pretty well told them that you're talking about corporate farming.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, the first requirement is to report whether you're a corporation of trust, et cetera, et cetera.

SENATOR DIERKS: That's right.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Now that information the Secretary of State already has with regard to each and every entity in the state, right?
