Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Madam President, members of the body. I'd just like to ask Senator Fisher a question if I might.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Fisher.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Senator Fisher, you indicated I think in your opening that this would be all...there'd be no fiscal impact. I guess my concern is if there's no fiscal impact the people who provide this training, how do they get trained?

SENATOR FISHER: They would be perhaps licensed, though we had the bow and arrow clubs that were here and they're all qualified with it and I suppose that they've participated in a number of procedures and even have their own hunting and bow instruction course.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, I guess I understand that and I certainly agree with that. I guess the question I had, in some areas where there's not a very active group, I wondered how, in order to qualify to get...to get certified or licensed, if there was any method that they would be able to go about in order to get the volunteers to go in and provide this kind of training? That...certainly I agree with the concept and have no problem with it. I was just a little bit concerned about how, in some areas where there's not a real strong club that provides this kind of service, how they would be able to access it.

SENATOR FISHER: Well, I, you know, I'm sure that could be a problem down the road but, you know, there's...there would just be a...somebody would have to be active in being come (sic) certified by the state for hunting with a bow and arrow, as they do with a shotgun or rifle.

SENATOR VRTISKA: The other part of that is then what you have seen as far as the hunter safety laws or rules are concerned in certification hasn't really been a problem.

SENATOR FISHER: It has not been in the hunter safety firearms section of it...
