PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR WILL: ...or enact constitutional amendments, or override certain gubernatorial vetoes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But I'm talking about Senator Wickersham's proposal, because that's the one that we're dealing with, which is going to add something, which again insures minority success. We're adding something that will insure that.

SENATOR WILL: It would be one more...one more vote that would, as you put it, insure minority success, if the minority is large enough.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, if it doesn't insure that, what does it do? Okay, thank you, 'cause our time is just about out.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Chambers, to close on his amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President and members of the Legislature, it is likely, but not necessarily so that I will be a part of that minority attempting to stop something from being done. And I asked Senator Will the questions that I did knowing what answers he would give and we all knew what answers he would give, but I wanted them a certain way so that when I bring out the transcript I can show you where you wanted to insure that I and my colleagues would have the opportunity to prevent the majority from doing what it wanted to do. When you require an affirmative vote, people don't have to vote no to defeat that proposition, they can simply be "not voting". They don't have to vote at all. And if the proposal that I am offering is rejected, I would hope that Senator Wickersham's total package does not get enough votes to be added to the rules. We clutter the rules, we change the rules, then the rules come back and bite us and then some people who have not been attentive while we are going through this process will say, how did this get into the rule book. Somebody asked me about a rule like that the other day. I acknowledged that when it comes to rules that deal with the internal organizing of the legislature and how it functions. Those rules, I don't have much interest in. I would
