PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you Senator Chambers. There has been a request for a call of the house. All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote nay. Please record.

CLERK: 11 ayes, 0 nays to go under call, Madam President.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The house is under call. Will senators please return to their seat's, will all unauthorized personnel please leave the floor. The house is under call. Senators please check in. Senator Warner, will you check in please. Senator Lindsay, Senator Pirsch, Senator Preister, Senator Landis, will you check in please. Senator Pirsch. The question before the body is the adoption of the Chambers amendment to the fourth section of the permanent rules. Senator Chambers has requested a roll call vote. Mr. Clerk, please proceed.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See pages 342-343 of the Legislative Journal). 3 ayes, 26 nays, Madam President on the amendment.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: The Chambers amendment fails. I raise the call. Is there anything further on the section of the permanent rules?

CLFRK: I have nothing further pending to the Rules Committee amendment. Is there any further discussion on the Rules Committee amendment? Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, members of the Legislature, I just want to ask Senator Wickersham a couple of questions.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Senator Wickersham.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, I won't need all of my time to speak at this point because I think in the course of what has happened I have said everything really in the way of assertions that I would want out there. Senator Wickersham, your amendment deals with bills killed at any stage of consideration in our process, is that correct?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: That is correct.
