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we discussed Senator Wehrbein, actually in committee, the idea of requiring anything to have to be printed before it could come up on a bill, but as we thought through that process it simply... there are enough times that we have to amend a bill on the floor because of something we find that is wrong in it or the fact that an amendment that we have at the Drafters doesn't get ready in time, just from a practical point of view, we couldn't find a way to make that system work. And, I share your concerns because we do get some tremendous numbers of amendments and some of them fairly lengthy in nature and digesting them all is not an easy task. But, we probably thought that the step that the Witek proposal takes is about as far as we could go reasonably. I think we all had situations where we needed to get an amendment up, we needed to get it up that day and just for one reason or another we are not able to print it a day ahead of time. But, certainly, and then we depend upon each others courtesy's to make sure that we reproduce the amendment, that we, you know, that we pass it out hopefully, and hopefully also have a good explanation of it. We all rely on that to some extent and I think our committee decided that that's the best system that we could have right now. I guess with respect to Senator Chambers concerns, I suppose we could draft some language to meet that, Senator Chambers, could I ask you a question?

SENATOR COORDSEN: Senator Chambers, would you respond?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR WILL: I kind of wanted to continue the dialogue that we were having with respect to requiring an amendment to be printed in the Journal whenever possible. Currently, as I understand it the Clerk uses a rule of thumb of ten pages that if an amendment is ten pages or less it is printed in the actual text of the Journal and over ten, it is printed and then filed in the Bill Room, and you and I were having a discussion off the mike about making sure that at least some some form of that system continues, correct?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR WILL: And, I guess, your concern under the language of this proposal would be that someone perhaps filed an amendment that ordinarily would be printed in the Journal under the rules
