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give you. It would give you a participatory process, a way by which we all could know what the important bills are. We could object to it if we want and then, once we know what they are, we can work towards them. We can work towards them together for a better Nebraska, for a program that we all can identify with and we can be a part of it. We don't have to wonder. Maybe the...take the Micron bill for example. Maybe if there had been a different process we could have had a debate about whether that should have been first on the agenda. We didn't. Some people got...a lot of people got input because we have that kind of a Speaker on that particular issue, but it ain't necessarily so. So special order is not the answer and, for my part, I'd do away with it altogether, except...

SENATOR CROSBY: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ..except I don't know how to deal (microphone not activated) through emergency situations yet.

SENATOR CROSBY: Before we go on to the... Thank you, Senator Beutler. Before we go on to the next speaker, we have some very special guests this morning who are guests of Senator Lynch. These people are here to, and they met with the Governor to organize the observance of the 150th year of the Mormon Trail from Illinois to Scottsbluff and they are: Dr. Brian Hill, chairman of the Mormon Trail from Kearney; Tom Furey; Mikki Keller; Frank Tierney; John Gondring, who's president of the North Omaha Commercial Club; and Elder and Sister Barker, who are from the Mormon winter quarters in Florida. Would you, they're under the south balcony, would you all please stand and be welcomed by the Legislature. Thank you for being here. Our next speaker is Senator Beutler.
