SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Before our next speaker I would like also to call the Legislature's attention. Senator Robinson has a special guest who's been here all week and she's under the south balcony this morning, Marnie Jensen (phonetic) from Dana College in Blair, Nebraska. Marnie (phonetic), where are you? Would you stand up and... Thank you. Senator Will?

SENATOR WILL: Question.

SENATOR CROSBY: The question has been called I'll go one more round, Senator Will. Senator Chambers, your light is next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Madam Chairman, let me go ahead and get something else straight this morning. Call the question all you want to, Senator Will and anybody else, and I'm going to start my reconsideration motions. You're not going to stop me this morning and I'm going to offer numerous attempts to amend the rules now. You've just gotten on the fighting side of me and I'm going to accept your challenge. Madam President, members of the Legislature, people keep talking as though the only ones who count in this Legislature are the Speaker and the committee chairpersons. The only reason they're chairpersons is because we voted for them. They're not wiser or better or of a higher moral order than the rest of us. I'm not satisfied that this is great because they're going to involve the chairpersons. Who are these chairpersons anyway? Before they got that position they were just like the rest of us and when they lose it they're going to be right back here again. I'm concerned about my prerogatives as a member of this Legislature and I'm not going to give them over to the Speaker, I'm not going to give them over to the chairpersons. And I will obstruct and obstruct and obstruct. You cannot stop me from doing that. And invoke your rule on being dilatory because I think that rule says if a motion or an amendment is ruled dilatory when one senator offers it, it cannot be offered by another. So I will just think of as many of the amendments I can that you all really want to offer and I'll offer all of them. And when mine are ruled dilatory you can't offer them either. That's the game you want to play; we will play it. And I will play it longer
