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done. If we get bogged down, such as Senator Beutler is talking about, it is tragic at times, it is tough, but it's our responsibility, as senators, to work together. It's our responsibility to get in the room with the Speaker or open it up and try to hammer things out. It is an abrogation of our responsibilities as individual representatives of our constituents to say, we don't have the energy or the experience, or obviously know how to do it,...

SPEAKER WITHEM: Time.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: ...we will let a person do it for us, and that's simply not our process or the way we should go.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body. I want to rise briefly to indicate that I remain opposed to this proposal. I want to indicate that in my previous remarks, when I indicated that one member of the Executive Board could sponsor a proposal from being designated as a major proposal, I was not directly or indirectly referring to Senator Chambers. I resent that implication, that was not the case. Thank you.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Bernard-Stevens, your light is on.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: I yield my time to Senator Chambers.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Excuse me, Senator Bernard-Stevens, I just got up here. You've already spoken, according to our records you've already spoken three times on the measure.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: That's fine, I'll abide by your ruling, but I would advise the Pages to keep better track, because I have not.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Avery. Senator Avery yields him time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature, I didn't hear what Senator Will said, but I think he mentioned my name. I'd like to ask him, Senator Will, did you make a reference to me, because I didn't hear exactly what you said?
