

ourselves you've got to put a time line in on this. Maybe this isn't exactly the time line you agree to, I wish you would amend it. Let's tell the public if we want to do it in twenty years, let's tell them it's going to be twenty years. If we're going to do it in five years, let's tell them it'll be five years. I think ten years is a reasonable period of time. And I think you ought to tell them we're going to get there in increments. I don't think you can go ten years and do nothing for nine and then have a plausible credibility with the public out there that you're going to do the rest of it in the tenth year, because we all know that's not going to happen. So if, if you want to make this meaningful, if this is something other than just fluff you need to put a schedule in there about how it's going to get done. And I would suggest that you adopt this and if there's further discussion about what should be done at what point in time, discuss that. But ten years at least puts it in sizeable chunks that we can deal with. That's, that's the value of saying ten years. The other value of saying ten years is so that we don't give the public false expectations. We pass this resolution without a deadline I'm sure the public's thinking, well, in a year or two or three this will be done. And you and I know it won't be done in a year or two or three, that it can't logically and thoughtfully be done in a year or two or three. And we ought to let the public know that. We ought to tell them exactly what we're about and then try to be about what we say we're about.
