can pick as his own personal priority bill, and beyond the other 48 senator priority bills. The Speaker can still pick five other bills that we would be able to bring to the top of the order, ahead of all of ours. I'm willing to say there might be some technical...there might be some times when that would be helpful. I don't like it, but I'm willing to concede that point. Maurstad's amendment certainly helped create the balance between committee chairs and the committee's responsibilities by saying it must work with the committees and the Speaker. But this last section gives...is going just a step too far. This last section says that when the Speaker, and the bills he picks, or she picks, some day, Senator Crosby and Senator Schimek...when the Speaker picks those bills and puts them to the top of the list, the Speaker can also then make the motions...decide which amendments and motions will be talked about in what order. And I just want to remind the body of something Senator Beutler said that technically was correct, but in theory, in practice it was...theoretically it was correct, but in practice it was incorrect. Senator Beutler said if the body had discipline we would always be able to talk about all the amendments, regardless if the amendment that, say, Senator Jensen had, the Speaker said was not very valuable, and put it at the bottom of the list. If we move quickly through the amendments then all the amendments would be able to be talked about. It's up to the body to decide that. On major controversial issues, as Senator Will indicated that these would probably be, that doesn't happen. We've seen it before, not only from Senator Chambers but Senator Dierks, from time to time, on water issues versus NRD voting rights, has decided to filibuster from time to time. Senator Pirsch, years ago, on an abortion issue, did a filibuster for a time. Senator Crosby certainly went into a...as much as she could to try to stop a welfare bill. We've all seen the controversial issues, they get bogged down and the body has to work very hard to get certain amendments agreed to or not. But eventually what happens is cloture is filed and passed. The amendments below that are never talked about. And what this particular section does is empower a Speaker to say, these are the amendments I think are the most important; these are the motions I think are the most important; and the rest of the motions and amendments filed by senators in good faith are not. I personally think that's appalling. I like to see the Legislature move quickly. I get frustrated when we get bogged down, but this is not a way to speed things up. This is a way that will create more animosity,
