discussion because all the amendments, good Lord, people, have some intelligence and say, look, I've got a bill that's coming out of a committee and I've got some committee amendments, we want to have certain amendments discussed. Then put them on the committee amendments for discussion. If you want to have amendments filed before you file the bill, a senator needs to understand my bill came out of committee, there are some issues I want to have done, I'm going to file my amendments and get prepared before it comes up. We can do that. But we don't want to do that. We want to give the power to the Speaker. And if you think about this rule, think about this one because there's no need for cloture after this rule's adopted because the Speaker can say, these are the four amendments we're going to talk about and the one motion we're going to talk about is the rules suspension to suspend the rules, no further debate, no further amendments. And we can do that after six minutes of debate...

SPEAKER WITHEM: Time.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: ...if the amendments take time.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, Mr. President, I would like to yield my time to Senator Chambers.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, if we look at our rule book, people keep talking about cloture in connection with this discussion, unless we're going to twist our rules, the only thing that cloture deals with is a bill, throughout. You don't see it saying the proposition, the proposal, or anything else. Cloture relates to a bill. And it's up to the sponsor to offer the cloture motion. It doesn't relate to amendments or an attempt to adopt the permanent rules. So unless we're going to see the Speaker or whoever's in the Chair pervert our rules in the way that I say it will be done, cloture does not apply to what we're discussing in terms of the rules. But Senator Beutler said something that I'd like to ask him a question about. Senator Beutler, what would prevent the Speaker from saying, oh, I'm, I'm...so you know what I'm talking about. The order of
