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And it's not because of the rules of the Legislature, it's because we individually are weak. There are weak links, Senator Beutler, in this body, and the Governor, the Attorney General, some judges can find individuals to carry water for them. That's what happens. So despite the presence or absence of this rule change, the essential nature of the Legislature will not alter at all. Until we get stronger people with a greater will to protect and advance the interests of the Legislature as an institution, nothing is going to change. It'll be that thing which is kicked around by the other two branches. That will continue to happen. This proposal that Senator Beutler so strongly supports has to do with taking away prerogatives from individual members so that when the Governor or one of these special interest groups comes in here with a steam roller, it cannot be stopped. All they have to coopt is the Speaker. He is correct, Senator Beutler is, about how quickly attention spans will lapse on the floor of the Legislature. He seemed to be kind of unsure that I should have used the term slow-witted and slow-footed, but then in his discussion he talked about how hard it is to keep people interested in a discussion about the rules because it's boring. But it's important. He is confirming by his presentation what I stated in two words, slow-witted. That's why I will always frankly express what is on my mind. And if there are chips that fall, let them lie where they fall. When I argue against these autocratic rules, I'm not doing it for my sake. You just give me additional tools with which to ply my trade. You cannot stop me if I want to talk. I can offer amendments, I can offer motions, and if the motion is ruled out of order, I can challenge that. So there will always be a way to be found. But for the rest of you that cannot be said because as Senator Beutler pointed out, to most people, the rules are a boring subject and people will not study them to find out what is therein. Some were surprised to find out the other day when I raised a point of order that the rules say that a person should only offer a bill or cosponsor it if he or she personally supports the bill. Didn't know that was in the rules, but it's one of the most important things that you can find there. Senator Beutler, I'm aware more of the ignorance of my colleagues than perhaps I am of the actual contents of the rules. I can say something's in the rule book even if it's not and people will say, I guess that's right. Fortunately I don't often do that. If I do it then I'll make it clear before we're through that I just manufactured that. I've suggested ways when I was engaging in a long discussion that if
