

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SENATOR ROBINSON: You go ahead.

SENATOR BEUTLER: But let's say that I haven't paid for three months and these negotiations have resulted in nothing. I just tell the county attorney, I'm not paying, for whatever reason. Then the county attorney or the authorized attorney would have the power to send out a notice. And they would send that notice by certified mail to this person who has not paid. And the, what's in the notice, if you're interested in looking, it's on page 5 and 6 of the bill. It has to say, obviously, what the problem is. It has to refer back to the support order so that the person knows what the problem derives from. It has to identify the delinquent amount. And then it has to tell him that within thirty days from the issuance of the notice, the license holder may request a hearing if he thinks there's been some kind of mistake of fact. It also tells him that he's in violation of the support order, but that he can come into compliance in this thirty day period if he chooses to do so. He can come into compliance by paying the support. He can come into compliance by paying the past due support. And if he's unable to pay, he can make an arrangement with the county attorney to set up a payment plan that will bring him into compliance. So you don't even have to pay to come into compliance, you just need to set up a payment plan that will eventually bring you into compliance. And then the notice also tells him that if he does nothing, that within thirty days after the issuance of the notice...

PRESIDENT ROBAK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...he does nothing, then a notice is going to be sent to the occupational licenser or to the DMV, depending on what we're talking about, and the procedure will be picked up there. And, Senator, if I'm next I'll proceed with the example.

SENATOR ROBINSON: All right, okay, good. If not, I'll get back to you.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. You are next, you may continue.
