PRESIDENT ROBAK: Time.

SENATOR PIRSCH: ...simplification.

PRESIDENT ROBAK: Thank you, Senator Pirsch, Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I think that probably I was able to mention in my discourse with Senator Pirsch...I mentioned the page 15 mechanism. But let me go back and reiterate something that I think is very important to you all, because it is part of the answer to much of what has come up. It's again that provision on page 9, at the bottom, Section 18. It says, if the license holder files a motion or application to modify a support order, the department, county attorney, or authorized attorney, upon notification by the license holder, shall stay the action, shall stay the action. That means that the license revocation action, whether it's for a driver's license or a professional license, stops, it's stayed. And nothing happens anymore until that motion that they've filed on the support order is heard by the district court. So that if there's any mistake, or it's too high for some reason and it shouldn't be so high, there's the opportunity to look at that. And, Senator Kristensen...and the thing that follows from that is well, what about is it too expensive to get a lawyer to file this motion? And that's...and that's where, Senator Pirsch, this page 15 provision kicks in, which provides a process by which they can get to that position and get that stay, even though they don't have the money to use an attorney to do it. And so I hope you'll look at those two provisions together, the one that starts on page 9 and flows over to the top of page 10 in conjunction with the provision on page 15, which starts on line 12. And...well, I'll stop there and invite additional questions, although I have some additional information that I think it's eventually important to share with you. But I think Senator Pirsch's point, as it applies to Senator Witek's amendment, is important. There is nothing in there that really provides the easy access to the courts for purposes of noncustodial parents' concern with respect to visitation, nothing in there that provides the forms and the affidavits that makes it possible for you to do it without an attorney, as there is in the bill itself. You will miss that
