

SENATOR LINDSAY: Or a taxi cab?

SENATOR LINDSAY: That might work. Senator Dierks, how about in your district? Can you have...you have pretty good transportation if you erroneously lose your drivers license, in your district?

You have got in Omaha and Lincoln it is not as big a deal to make...to have an error because for those few days, or few months, or however long it takes, you to get the state bureaucracy, which we all know works very quickly and does whatever it can to correct those errors as quickly as possible, and I don't think we have ever handled issues from constituents where they run into problems with a state bureaucracy, but during that time, what are you going to do in those rural areas? You don't...if there are no buses, if there are no taxi's and you don't have a license to drive, through no fault of your own. Or lets move it into the city. Lets move it into Omaha, lets have an over the road trucker who goes out on the road, gets one of these erroneous letters while they are gone and they don't get back from their over the road trucking until after their time is expired. Their license is suspended, now they can't work for a living and they are going to get actually suspended because they can't pay their support because they don't have any money coming in. I think the issue of erroneous revocation of license is a very real issue and I think it is an issue that has to be addressed. One way of addressing it is saying that if we want to go down this road that may have some jeopardy for citizens in it, let's at least provide an avenue of recovery. And that is what the Witek amendment does. The Chambers amendment I think is just an extension of how far do you want to extend that liability, but I think you ought to have somebody against whom a citizen who has done nothing wrong, a citizen who has done nothing wrong and yet loses their livelihood or loses their license or is just merely inconvenienced, but the range of possibilities is there. I think we have to address that. I
