

policy-making, the decision-making if they don't have information at their hands? The press will report to the public what it needs to know about, about the numbers of people who have their licenses revoked. Don't think they won't report it, they of course will report it. Public policy isn't made in a vacuum, it needs information. And this is, this is one mechanism through which we can get that information. Now, Senator Chambers, the part of your amendment that deals with not the, not the reinstated language, but the erroneous revocation,...

SPEAKER WITHEM: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...how do you determine, how does the, how does this report it? How do you determine what licenses have been erroneously revoked? What will be the process here?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schimek, we already have a provision in the bill which says that should it be determined that a license is erroneously revoked the person would not have to pay that fee, and if they had already paid it, it would be returned. So in any of those instances that had occurred during the previous, the prior year that the report covers, that number would be included in the report.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That number would...but how, how does the, how does the reporting agency get this number?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Somebody would undoubtedly tell them, unless they caught it on their own, in which case they wouldn't revoke the license or if they did, they would already know that they had done it erroneously. Of if a person complained and established that there was an error, they would have that information.

SPEAKER WITHEM: Time.
